


Join us for upcoming in-person trainings on economic and disaster housing recovery.

About this Training

This training is designed to provide learners with information on business financial literacy and the potential financial effects of disasters. Some of the areas covered in the course include developing pre-disaster plans for financial literacy, understanding disaster assistance programs that are available to businesses, the importance of business continuity planning, and understanding a business's vulnerability to disasters.

Upon completion of this course, the learner will be able to successfully complete questions based on the following enabling learning objectives:

1. Identify key elements of business financial literacy, including critical components of pre-disaster planning, such as the benefits, hazards, risks, and key stakeholders, especially in vulnerable areas.
2. Restate business action steps for increasing disaster financial readiness in a disaster financial management strategy.
3. Identify components of a collaborative economic recovery plan that incorporates resources from public, private, and volunteer agencies.
4. Identify quantitative and qualitative tools useful in performing economic assessments after a disaster (e.g., assessing damage to property).
5. Recognize ways to coordinate intermediate and long-term plans among whole-community partners who can support business financial recovery.

About this Training

This instructor-led training will present information on how communities can execute strategies to rapidly rehabilitate damaged housing. This course will bring together elements of the web-based awareness-level courses titled “Case Management and Rapid Rehabilitation” into a one-day planning workshop to provide training consisting of planning tools and resources for the community to conduct disaster housing planning and damage assessments as well as leverage mitigation planning and projects to reduce recovery costs.

Upon completion of this course, the learner will be able to successfully complete questions based on the following enabling learning objectives:

1. Given a case study, the learner will identify common reasons for delays in rebuilding damaged housing after a disaster and the benefits of rapid housing rehabilitation.
2. Based on program policy guidance documents, learner will identify at least two objectives of rapid rehabilitation programs.
3. Given a case study, the learner will identify three ways state/tribal/local and nonprofit partners can support the launch and implementation of a rapid rehabilitation program.
4. Using FEMA’s Individuals and Households Program guidelines for reference, the learner will identify how the MLR Program can provide temporary housing options to disaster survivors.
5. Based on program guidelines, learner will identify three key considerations FEMA makes in identifying potential multifamily lease and repair properties.
6. Given a case study, the learner will identify ways to use the Pre-Disaster Mitigation Program to increase the effectiveness of post-disaster recovery through actions such as state and local code enforcement, permitting, and utility restoration.
7. Based on program guidelines, the learner will be able to differentiate between roles of applicant and sub-applicant for the Pre-Disaster Mitigation Program.

About this Training

This instructor-led course will provide learners with information on the importance of pre-planning for housing recovery to accelerate recovery after a disaster occurs. The course will provide lessons on the basics of disaster housing planning and best practices of housing planning. The course will improve knowledge and understanding of FEMA's direct temporary housing and permanent housing construction programs, including strategies to rapidly and efficiently initiate direct temporary housing and permanent housing construction programs, including the implications for code enforcement, permitting, and utility restoration. The course will also demonstrate the process of coordinating agreements and processes regarding the collection, sharing and handling of sensitive, personally identifiable information from federal and non-federal sources.

Upon completion of this course, the learner will be able to successfully complete questions based on the following enabling learning objectives:

1. Identify concepts of disaster housing and identify the importance of disaster housing planning.
2. Identify best practices for implementing current FEMA housing assistance programs and grants.
3. Identify the benefits and limitations of temporary housing.
4. Identify the benefits and limitations of long-term recovery assistance.
5. Identify public resources to assist in planning and to ensure adherence to local building codes, permitting and utility restoration.
6. Identify the roles and responsibilities of disaster housing task force.
